SAWYER BUSINESS FIRMS.

Teweles & Brandeis, Produce Buyers, Do a Big Business in This City. Owners of Large Warehouses and Valuable Dock Property. Olson & Forland, Dealers in Lumber and Building Material.

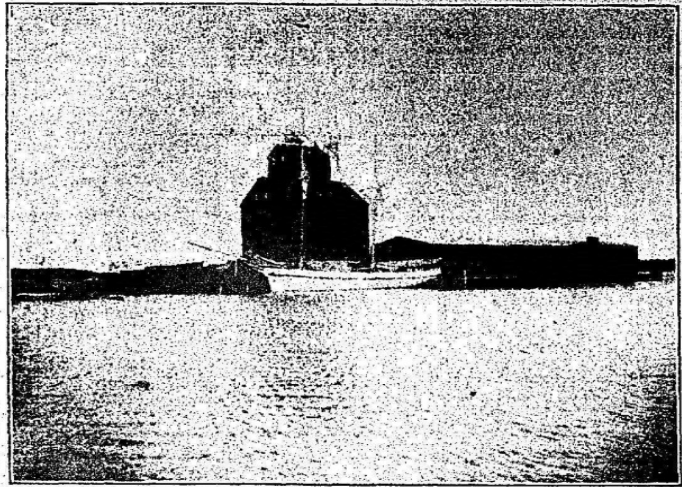


AMONG the best known business firms in Sawyer is that of Teweles & Brandeis, grain and produce buyers. Their business has brought them in contact with a large number of farmers, and during the years that they have been located in Sawyer have built up a business that speaks well for the firm. They

also conduct the same line of business on the east side of the bay, it being in charge of Arthur Teweles, while the buying in this part of the city is looked after by Isadore Brandeis.

The company's property in Sawyer consists of a large elevator, dock property and large warehouses. The elevator has a capacity of 30,000 bushels of grain and is equipped with the latest machinery, which is run by an eight horse power Fairbanks-Morse gasoline engine. The elevator is equipped with a clipper cleaner and automatic scales, which are of great value in a business of this kind. The elevator stands 90 feet high, and is located where shipments can be made from it by either rail or boat. The firm makes a specialty of handling peas and thousands of bushels are shipped south each year, they being put up in bags and transported to the southern market by boat. The majority of the wheat, rye and barley handled by the firm is shipped south in bulk by rail, the cars being run to the elevator on a side track, where they are quickly loaded. Five men are generally kept employed about the elevator, and the handling of the grain is in charge of Jeff Teweles, an experienced man in that line of business.

The firm also own the old planing mill building on their premises, which they utilize as a place to sort and pick over their peas, there being twelve girls employed in this work during several months of the year.

The dock property owned by Teweles & Brandeis is situated at the foot of Maple avenue, and very convenient for the business interests of the city. At this dock all the boat transportation companies, that run into this port, stop, and a great deal of freight received and shipped over it. The dock has a frontage of 140 feet, and extends 150 feet out from the shore, the water being deep enough to accommodate the largest craft. Two large warehouses are built here, one at the end of the dock, 36x100 feet, which is used principally by Teweles & Brandeis for the handling of their peas, and the other, 45x110 feet connecting it on the west, and running along the south side of the dock, and used principally for freight brought in here by the transportation companies. The dock business is in charge of Halver Halverson.

The Green Stone & Quarrying Co. Saturday closed the contract for the purchase of the barges A. A. Carpenter and Myron Butman from Capt. Jas. Madigan, of Buffalo. The former craft is 105 feet long, with 33 feet beam, and measures 540 gross tons; the latter is 84 feet long, 21 feet beam and 424 gross tons. This will give the company three very good stone carriers and with the big tug Torment to tow them they will be able to make quick trips as they are all good sea boats and are in good condition. A peculiar coincidence in connection with this sale is the fact that the barge Baldwin was used for many years to tow the Carpenter and Butman and the last trip, the Baldwin made under her own motive power these same two barges were her consorts. It will be remembered that the Baldwin was sunk in Green Bay several years ago while endeavoring to force her way through the ice with the two barges in tow and the local stone company purchased the wreck and raised it after which the machinery was taken out and the hull repaired and converted into a stone barge.

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Anniversary Jubilee a Success.

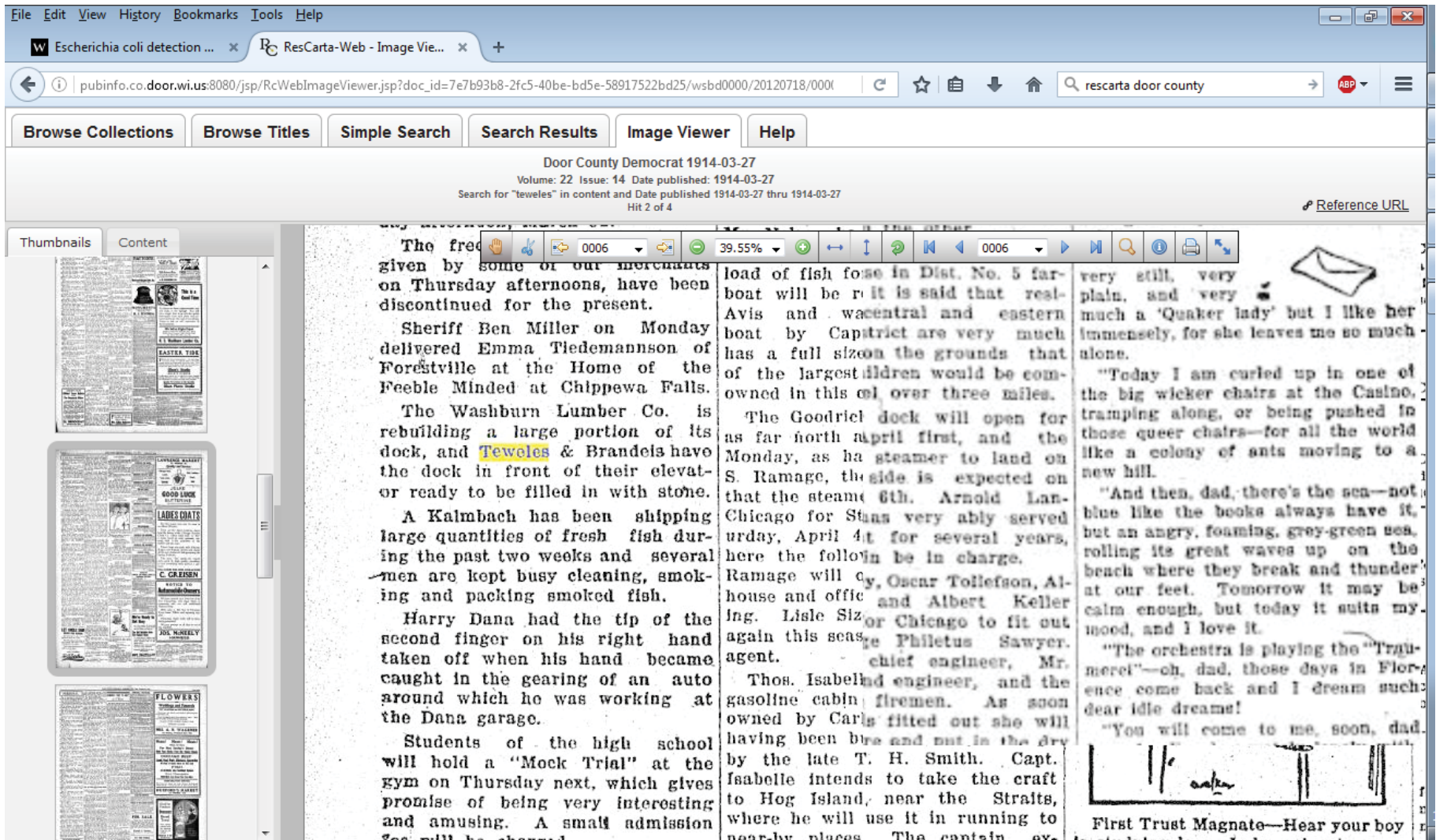

The Washburn Lumber Co. is rebuilding a large portion of its dock, and Teweles & Brandels have the dock in front of their elevator ready to be filled in with stone.

Kashmash has been shipping large quantities of fresh fish during the past two weeks and several men are kept busy cleaning, smoking and packing smoked fish.

According to a chart compiled by the Wisconsin Agri-culturist, Door county has 170 automobiles, which is 49 less than our neighbor, Kewaunee county. According to reports of local auto agents, the

number of autos in Door county will be materially increased this season.

Spring was ushered in officially on Saturday, March 21. The weather, however, was more in keeping with fall than with spring, and on the following day there was quite a heavy fall of snow, which covered the ground several inches deep. This was soon dissipated when the sun came out.

Ramage, the local agent, states that the steamer Georgian will leave Chicago for Sturgeon Bay on Saturday, April 4th, and will arrive here the following Monday. Mr. Ramage will open the dock warehouse and office next Monday morning. Lisle Sizor will be employed again this season as assistant dock agent.

Thos. Isabelle has purchased the gasoline cabin launch which was owned by Carl Dretzner, the boat having been built a few years ago by the late T. H. Smith. Capt. 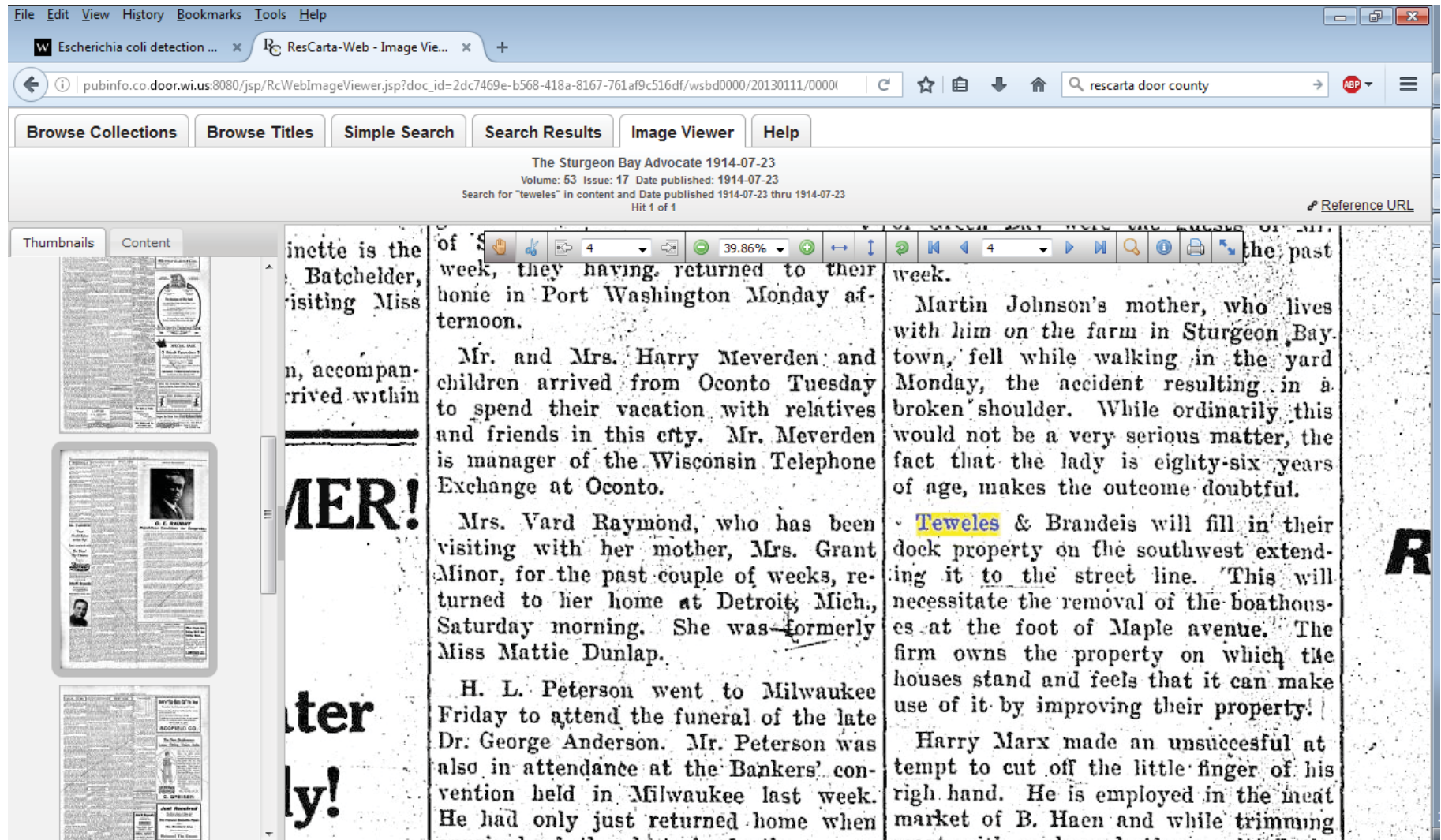
